The OnePlus 2 has finally launched. OnePlus' latest flagship follows on from the OnePlus One; a phone that owes its success to offering top-of-the-range hardware at a price that undercuts Apple and Samsung.

een to emulate the success of the OnePlus One, the OnePlus 2 is another affordable class-topping flagship. Like the OnePlus One, the OnePlus 2 will only be available on an invite-only basis."From day one, we've prioritised our product and our community above all else - we carefully listened to our users' feedback and incorporated suggestions in building the OnePlus 2," said **OnePlus founder and CEO Pete Lau. "We** chose premium materials, the highest performing components and forward thinking technology to make this an unparalleled user experience."

ONEPLUS 2 DESIGN

The OnePlus 2 comes in an aluminium-magnesium body with stainless steel accents. There's a 5.5-inch display and OnePlus claims it offers crystal clear views in direct sunlight, regardless of whatever angle the phone is held at. Weighing in at 175 grams, the OnePlus 2 is also a lightweight phone. It is available in a range of covers, including wood built Bamboo, Black Apricot, Rosewood and Kevlar.

ONEPLUS 2 HARDWARE

This flagship device also comes with a powerful 3,300 mAh battery, which should provide plenty of power to last you throughout the day. It also has support for two Nano SIM cards with 4G LTE connectivity. A whopping 64GB of storage should also give you plenty of space for videos, music, apps, games and other media you want to download on your phone. Beneath the OnePlus 2's shell is a powerful Snapdragon 810 processor, the fastest processor available. The processor has been notorious for overheating problems in the past, but OnePlus claims it may have solved the issue.

"Although there have been reports that the 810 runs warmer than its predecessors, we assure you that we have taken all the necessary precautions and beyond to prevent this from occurring in the 2. "We worked very closely with Qualcomm's engineers to integrate an improved version of the chipset (v2.1) in the OnePlus 2, and fine-tuned both hardware and software. The 2 will be 'cooler than ever'." The OnePlus 2 is also the first flagship device to come with a USB Type-C charging port. USB Type C cables means you needn't worry about plugging in your charging cable upside down. It'll also allow for faster data transfers.

ONEPLUS 2 FINGERPRINT SCANNER

There's also a fingerprint scanner and OnePlus claims the scanner allows you to unlock your phone in under half a second. You can store up to five different fingerprints in the device.

ONEPLUS 2 CAMERA

Head to the back of the phone and you'll find a 13-megapixel camera that has six lenses and a powerful dual LED flash. There's also an impressive sensor that OnePlus claims can deliver low-light photographs "like you've never seen before". At the front is a 5 megapixel camera.

OXYGEN OS

The OnePlus 2 pairs OxygenOS with Android Lollipop. OxygenOS is a more streamlined imagining of Android. Complete off-screen gesture controls will allow you to turn the screen on and launch apps with a simple gesture. A built-in file manager and more customisation options are also be built into the OS. There are customisable quick settings and the option to change between software and hardware navigation keys. "With the OnePlus 2, we're making a bet on the future, and doubling down on a holistic product experience," said OnePlus co-founder Carl Pei. "We're excited for what our fans have to say."

ONEPLUS 2 PRICE AND RELEASE DATE

The 64GB OnePlus 2 will be available to purchase with an invite on August 11 for £289. The 16GB version with 3GB of RAM will be available later in the year.

LG G4 Beat

LG has announced another new addition to its rather bloated smartphone product line-up that aims to fill the gaps below the G4. The problem is, can it differentiate itself? Tom Wellburn reports.

he current LG line of smartphone devices is getting pretty cluttered but the Korean company clearly still thinks there are some areas which need filling in. Sitting somewhere between the LG G4, the Spirit 4G and the G4c, the new LG G4 Beat has some big shoes to fill if it wants any hope of standing out. The device looks to be a step down from the flagship LG G4, offering upper mid-range hardware specs in a scaled back package.

SPITTING IMAGE

Announced in early July, the device will feature a 5.2 inch Full HD IPS display, which puts the pixel density somewhere around 424 pixels per inch. This is a great panel that wouldn't look out of place on some lesser flagships. Interestingly, the display is only slightly smaller than the one found on the LG G4, which is evident in the overall size of the device. Measuring 142 x 73 x 9.9mm, you'd be hard pressed to find any difference between this and its bigger brother. It should be interesting to see how they look side by side, as there really isn't much in it on paper.

also carried over from the G4, meaning you'll have total control over your pictures. In a slightly odd move, the Latin American markets will get a 13 megapixel variant that sports an improved rear camera. The front-facing camera is also well catered for, with a 5 megapixel snapper that includes the Gesture Interval Shot feature that accommodates onehanded self-portraits.

PRICE AND AVAILABILITY

The device will ship with the newest version of Android 5.1.1 Lollipop and LG's own UX 4.0 overlay. The overlay is definitely one of the better launchers on the market, with decent performance and less bloatware than some of their competitors. While there's no word on price, we expect it to cost in the region of £250 to £300. No word on when it will reach the UK, though LG has said that the G4 Beat will debut in 'key markets' very soon. You'll be able to pick it up in either Metallic Silver, Ceramic White or Shiny Gold. Definitely one to keep your eye's peeled out for.

WELL-POWERED

The phone features a powerful 1.5GHz octa-core Qualcomm Snapdragon 615, which is a solid mid-range processor with plenty of power for most users. The chip is 4G LTE and 64 bit capable, though the latter won't

make much difference due to the inclusion of only 1.5GB RAM. At this tier, it would have been nice to see LG include a little bit extra and push it to 2GB. Still, the battery is pretty decent at 2,300 mAh, which should help it reach a solid day's use.

SOLID SNAPPER

The camera on the Beat is definitely a focal point of the new device, carrying over lots of functionality from the more powerful G4. On the back, you'll be treated to an 8 megapixel sensor which uses LG's exclusive Colour Spectrum Sensor and Laser Autofocus. The excellent manual mode is

he Vodafone Smart Tab Prime 6 will seem like an obvious choice if you're after an affordable tablet with 4G. After all, it only costs £150 to purchase the device on Pay As You Go, and you can choose how much data you want each month after that initial purchase. It also feels more well built than its retail price suggests, and it packs a good number of features. Closer inspection, however, soon reveals many flaws. Hop onto a Pay Monthly plan and the device can become pretty expensive. Just 1GB of data will cost you £17 per month with a £19 upfront cost. The most expensive option is £31 a month for 8GB of data. This means ownership can skyrocket up to £744 throughout two years if you go Pay Monthly. Pay As You Go is the wisest choice here. There simply aren't enough redeeming features to outweigh the negatives and you'll soon wish you'd splashed out a little bit extra on a device that does a much better job.

DESIGN

The Smart Tab Prime 6's major strength is its design. Measuring just 7.99mm and weighing just 406g, it is a sleek and light device that feels much more expensive than its price suggests. The screen size measures 9.6 inches, giving you plenty of space to view videos, images, eBooks or whatever else you want to use the device for. A rubber back ensures the device won't slip out of your hands and rounded corners finish off what is a very well-built tablet.

CAMERA

The rear of the tablet has a 5MP camera, which is pretty standard for a tablet these $% \left[{{\left[{{n_{\rm{s}}} \right]}_{\rm{s}}}} \right]$

days. It's one of the tablet's weaker points and we doubt you'll get much use out of it. Colours and details were passable but did appear a little off most of the time. HDR mode didn't do much to improve anything, either, which was a shame. The 2MP front camera is equally as lackluster and selfie fans won't be in a hurry to use it.

SCREEN

The Vodafone Smart Tab Prime 6 was ultimately disappointing and where the device's biggest flaws appeared. Yes, the 9.6 inch screen is massive, but the 1280 x 800 resolution didn't really deliver a good enough image quality. Icons, images and text weren't crisp enough and appeared blurry most of the time. This all becomes really obvious when you view videos and most colours looked really washed out and

drab. This proves particularly difficult in bright outdoor settings and you'll struggle to see what's on screen.

PERFORMANCE

Performance isn't that great either. The quad-core 1.2GHz Qualcomm Snapdragon 410 processor was seriously underwhelming. Gamers will want to avoid this tablet. It struggled to even load Hearthstone and crashed before the game managed to boot

up the main menu. This is the first time Hearthstone has ever crashed on us when testing a device, which was surprising considering it's not a particularly intensive 2D game. Other 2D games such as Crossy Road and Words With Friends managed to boot up and run without crashing, even though there were some noticeable moments of stutter. We tried to open up more processor intense games like Real Racing 2 and Galaxy on Fire 2 but the tablet crashed within seconds.

Move outside of gaming and the processor is still quite noticeably sluggish. Sites such as Buzzfeed, which are crammed with images and videos, were excruciatingly slow to load up and suffered from noticeable lag throughout our browsing experience.

There is a decent amount of internal storage at 16GB and it also supports 32GB of external storage through microSD cards, which is expected from a tablet at this price.

SOFTWARE

VERDICT

Android Lollipop 5.0, Google's latest Android operating system, already comes installed out of the box and gives the tablet quite a slick-looking skin. Despite our early criticisms about performance, navigating through the tablet is actually quite a simple and straightforward task.

Bloatware is limited to a select few Vodafone apps, the most useful of which being the Vodafone Net Perform app. This lets you monitor how much data you're using and test network speeds. So you can make sure you're not overusing data or see how strong the network in your area really is. My Vodafone will also let you monitor how many minutes, texts or data you've used if you're on a Pay Monthly contract or your remaining credit if you're a Pay As You Go customer.

BATTERY

Battery life is quite decent. A 4,600mAh battery gives the device plenty of usage time and we never struggled to get a day's usage out of the device through moderate usage. Those on long journeys will find little to complain about in the battery life department.



Yes, the Vodafone Smart Tab Prime 6 is one of the most affordable 4G devices on the market but we'd recommend spending a little bit extra on a device that has better software and performance if you can. The screen quality isn't that great on this device and videos, images and icons noticeably lacked the crisp quality that similarly priced devices have. Performance didn't impress either and games such as Hearthstone, which aren't that processor-intense, crashed within seconds of opening. Sure, the tablet does feel a lot more expensive than the cheap price tag suggests and the battery life will suit long-haul travellers. These positives, unfortunately, aren't enough to redeem what is quite an average tablet.

V odafone has created a reputation for producing well-designed and feature-packed devices that won't massively drain your bank balance. Costing £125, or £17 per month, the Smart Ultra 6 follows this trend and offers a worthy alternative to EE's £200 Harrier.

DESIGN

That £125 price tag gets you a device with features normally seen on more expensive flagship handsets. The 5.5-inch screen is just as large as the LG G4 but the design is ruined slightly by a cheap plastic shell. Vodafone has dressed this up with a shiny trim around the edges, whilst light up buttons create an attractive glow. Its size does make it slightly awkward to hold and fit in your pocket.

There's no removable back, which means the SIM and memory cards are housed in side drawers. The sealed back does make it feel like quite a tough and sturdy device, whilst we had no problem locating and using the volume and power buttons.

CAMERA

Amateur and dedicated photographers will both find something they like about the Smart Ultra 6. Head to the rear and you'll find a very impressive 13 megapixel camera. This is one of the best cameras we've tested on a budget device, with all our photographs appearing crisp, colourful and full of detail.

You can take even better photographs by heading into Manual mode. This allows you to adjust white balance, ISO, exposure levels and other features normally found on a DSLR, the standalone camera used by professional

photographers. HDR mode also does a decent job of dressing up your photos, which is perfect when you don't have the time or energy to fiddle around with the various Manual mode settings. The 5 megapixel front camera is also good but is let down by the lack of flash.

The camera app is very simple to use and we had no trouble switching between the various modes or adjusting any of the settings. A variety of filters and shooting modes, including panoramic and multi-exposure, complete what is an excellent camera setup overall.

PERFORMANCE

Performance is where you'll get the most value for money here. An octa-core Qualcomm Snapdragon 610 processor and 2GB of RAM in a phone this cheap is seriously impressive and our tests proved that.

Web browsing was quick and stutter free, especially when we surfed through image and video heavy sites like BuzzFeed. Games like Hearthstone also ran smoothly, whilst there was no noticeable lag when we ran games like Real Racing 3.

There's 16GB of storage, which provides plenty of space for apps, video, music and other media you have. If that isn't enough memory for you, you can expand it up to an impressive 64GB with an external microSD memory card.

SOFTWARE

The Smart Ultra 6 runs Android Lollipop 5.0 out of the box, which means you'll experience Google's latest slick operating system immediately. Vodafone hasn't tampered with the operating system too much, so you'll be getting Lollipop the way it was intended.

SCREEN

The 5.5-inch screen did a great job of making all the colours in games and and HD videos pop out. Everything on screen was full of detail and vibrancy, which you'd expect from a device boasting 1920 x 1080 resolution. The screen also suffered very few issues with glare when we used it outside. Physical buttons are absent, so there's nothing to get in the way of your viewing experience.

BATTERY

Battery life was just as impressive and we easily got a day's use out of it without any struggle. That was through moderate usage of gaming, emailing, WhatsApp and YouTube. On other days where we constantly viewed videos, played games and put it through its paces, we got half a day's battery life, which is still pretty good.

VERDICT

The Vodafone Smart Ultra 6 packs plenty of excellent features you'd normally find on a phone that costs double its £125 Pay As You Go price tag. A brilliant processor, screen that displays everything in crisp full HD detail, fantastic camera and long-lasting battery life makes this handset seriously good value for money. If you're after one of the best value handsets money can buy, the Vodafone Smart Ultra 6 is highly recommended.

Microsoft Lumia 640 XL

Microsoft is back with what could be the company's final smartphone before the launch of Windows 10 Mobile. How does it stack up against similarly priced phablet devices?

The Lumia 640XL could be the swansong of this Windows Phone generation, with the next major release likely coming just before or after the availability of Windows 10 Mobile. It keeps with the company's now defunct marketing method of attacking every possible device range and product line imaginable, which has so far saturated the Windows Phone brand to near drowning point. This device primarily competes with phablet devices around the six inch range, meaning it's got tough competition from the likes of the Apple iPhone 6 Plus and Samsung Galaxy Note 4. However, in typical Microsoft fashion, they've priced the device cheaper, opting to use cold, harsh cash as a way to lure people into the Windows ecosystem. In reality, it should be scared of similar devices like the Asus Zenfone 2.

DESIGN

Functional and simplistic are words I would use to describe the Lumia 640 XL. The Microsoft devices certainly have a unique appeal about them but rarely set the world alight with space-age materials and paper-thin slimness. Polycarbonate plastics make up the majority of the device, with an all-glass front comprised of cornering Gorilla Glass 3. It's a design theme that you will notice through most of the Lumia line and you'll either love it or hate it. There's a bit of déjà vu in the Lumia 640 XL, as you could be forgiven for thinking it was a standard Lumia 640. The only major difference is the size, in which the 640 XL dwarfs its little brother.

At 9mm thick it's not the slimmest device in the world, though the curved edges help to make it feel a lot smaller than it actually is. With a 5.7 inch display, it's also smaller than most other phablets on the market which tend to float around the 6 inch mark. Still, it does feel quite bulky and wide, with my hands struggling to grip the thing comfortably at times. The speaker vent has been moved from its original position on the Lumia 640 and now resides next to the camera sensor, a much better placement that doesn't result in your hands smothering the sound in landscape mode.

As is typical with other Lumia devices, you

get plenty of colour options to choose from. The back panel is removable, allowing you to easily switch things up and access the microSD/ sim card slot. There's also OI wireless charging as standard, which is a nice feature if you have the required peripherals to use it. The Lumia 640 XL is available in a mix of both matted and glossy variants. As always, we reckon you should opt for the former, which is far less likely to become a fingerprint magnet.

CAMERA

The camera on the Lumia 640 XL is a trump card that manages to take some very good images for the price. With a 13 megapixel sensor and Carl Zeiss optics, there is a notable increase in image detail over the standard Lumia 640. It still doesn't excel in low-light and it does struggle with a bit of noise, but even these are all acceptable compromises given the price. In well-lit conditions, the camera even manages to challenge the more expensive Lumia 830, showing just how good Microsoft's camera tech has gotten across the range.

The 5 megapixel front camera is also equally impressive for such an inexpensive device, providing a good amount of detail in well-lit conditions. With 1080p 30fps support for both this and the rear camera, those who enjoy Skype calling and Instagram should quite happy with its ability to take selfies and video.

SCREEN

The Lumia 640 XL has a large 5.7 inch panel with a middling 1280 x 720 HD resolution. At this size, that equates to only 258 pixels-per-inch. In the days of Full HD panels and 300+ DPI resolutions, it'll be a little disappointing to some people. Pixilation is evident up close and jagged edges can be clearly seen around lettering and images. It's likely that a Full HD panel would've bumped up the cost a fair amount, so it's understandable that Microsoft went for a generic display at this price point. On the plus side, the panel itself is a very high quality IPS display, with no colour

deviation even at extreme angles. It also has a really impressive maximum brightness, making colours literally pop out of the screen.

You get the proprietary ClearBlack built into the panel, which is a technology previously developed by Nokia to enhance dark contrast and colours. By using three special layers within the panel, it helps to increase sunlight readability and colour reproduction by reflecting unwanted light away from your face. Imagine it as a pair of sunglasses for your smartphone screen.

PERFORMANCE

Although the device is bigger and more expensive than the 640, it uses exactly the same quad-core 1.2GHZ Snapdragon 400 processor as its little brother. It's a little disappointing and it would've been nice to see a Snapdragon 610 make an appearance. Still, the processor is partly one of the reasons it has managed to keep the device so cheap. Thankfully, Windows Phone is so well optimised that even lower-spec hardware feels quick and speedy, with little lag when navigating the user interface.

Responsiveness was almost identical to the Lumia 640 we reviewed last issue, with only a slight delay in opening apps and impressive gaming performance. Playing Asphalt 8: Airborne

was a buttery smooth experience, with a near consistent frame-rate. Obviously, detail settings are dialled back somewhat versus the Android flagship counterparts but the loss is only minimal. I'd take that over a low frame-rate any day. As an added bonus, the device remained ice cool during the entire 45 minute session.

SOFTWARE

=

Running on Windows Phone 8.1 Update 2 with Lumia Denim, it brings some notable updates to the unique operating system. The settings menu has undergone an overhaul, with everything now clearly labelled and much easier to access. Live tiles can now be grouped into folders, helping to unclutter an otherwise congested home screen. Things such as independent volume controls and a dedicated notification centre make a welcome return, which help to complement the unique live tile experience. Glance has also got an improvement, showing health and fitness information while the phone is sleeping plus weather updates. As always, we recommend using this feature with an OLED display to reduce battery drain.

The OS has also gained its own dedicated voice assistant, Cortana, which sits somewhere between Google Now and Siri in functionality.

The service will be making the jump to Android and iOS in July, so it will probably be available at the time you're reading this. Google is still light-years ahead of the competition when it comes to sheer data but Cortana has some unique abilities itself that helps to give some identity. The ability to act as a secretary and set appointments or reminders is a handy tool. It also has a home page which acts as a hub for all your news, appointment information and locations, handy if you need to check your schedule at a glance.

You'll also get a year's free subscription to Office 365 worth £59.99, which gives you Word, Excel, PowerPoint and Outlook, plus 1TB of OneDrive cloud storage. As we stress every time a Windows device gets reviewed, the operating system is still struggling to attract third party applications with a poor selection currently available. Many of the official apps such as Facebook and Instagram are pretty dire versus their Android/ iOS counterparts, though in some cases there are viable alternatives within the store which offer a better experience. It's a shame too, as those which do put in the effort really show how great the OS can look and feel.

BATTERY

The Lumia 640 XL has a monstrous battery that you'll be hard pressed to find on devices with six inch screens, let alone 5.7 inch variants. At 3000mAh, it puts most competitors to shame and easily reaches one and a half days of relatively heavy usage. Even gaming proved to be no match for its huge battery, sipping only about 7-10% after a good 45 minutes on Asphalt 8: Airborne. Under normal usage, you should have little problem getting the device beyond the two day mark. It also has a fully removable battery, which is another huge positive. If you're ever out on a long camping trip but need to keep in touch, it's far easier to bring a spare battery than lug around a powerbar. Other phone manufacturers would do well to follow in its shoes.

CONCLUSION

There's very few bad things to say about this device considering the price and features that you get for the money. It's got an excellent screen that could perhaps do with being a higher resolution and a processor that's a little on the slow side but still capable given the speedy Windows OS. Aside from this, both cameras are very good and the overall design is sturdy if a little bulky.

VERDICT

Although it's slightly more expensive than the standard Lumia 640, you still get a considerable amount of goodies for your money. With a rear camera that closely matches the Lumia 830 in daytime conditions and a generously sized screen that is perfect for Netflix on-the-go, there's plenty to like about this device. It's just a shame about the underpowered processor and somewhat bulky design. Still, at this price-point, you shouldn't expect flagship performance. In this case, the Lumia 640 XL is still a very good device.

It's due to be released later this year and Windows Phone 8 users will be entitled to the upgrade for free. The only catch is that you'll need 1GB ram to get the full experience it has to offer.

Microsoft Lumia 435

Microsoft's cheapest handset to date costs a mere 40 quid in some UK retailers. Does it have what it takes to surprise us, or will the price reflect its performance?

WW ith the Lumia 640 and 640XL taking up the majority of our time recently, we decided to carry on the theme with an ever cheaper device. If you think that £109.99 is cheap for a Lumia 640, Microsoft can go lower. The Lumia 435 is the company's cheapest device ever released, coming in at a miniscule £40 in some retailers. For that

price, you'd be lucky to buy a dumbphone, let alone a smart one. It really has no competition when it comes to the cost but is it actually usable? Let's see.

DESIGN

In a familiar polycarbonate design, the Lumia 435 looks like most other devices from the range aside from some minor differences. Microsoft has

It actually feels pretty comfortable to hold and does a good job of resisting fingerprints thanks to the matte finish. You could easily be forgiven for thinking it cost more, such is the deceptive quality of the aesthetics.

With an overall thickness of 11.7mm, it's definitely comparable to a brick. That said, it helps to give a nice grip in your hand and you'll never forget where it is. The other dimensions are much quainter, at only 118.1 x 64.7. It's tiny size and minimal features help to give it a weirdly endearing appearance. While I wouldn't call it premium, it's certainly cute.

On the side you get volume keys and a power button but no dedicated camera shutter, as is expected from a non-Pureview device. The rear cover is easily removed to reveal a 1,560mAh and sim tray (a dual sim version is also available). The device also has a microSD slot which can take up to 128GB of SDXC memory, a very nice addition for the price.

CAMERA

With a 2 megapixel camera, don't expect it to win many awards for picture quality. I'll try my best to be lenient here due to the bargainbin pricing but the camera is still pretty bad. Low-light is noisy and there is a lack of autofocus, meaning it's difficult to get sharp images. Daytime images are passable, though they lack the colour range and definition to really make them pop.

The front camera is only VGA, which is almost like stepping through a time portal. It's a noisy, blurred mess that looks incredibly soft and

really isn't much use for anything aside from the odd video call. Again, there's little room to be complaining for 40 quid. It's worth bearing in mind that most phones at this price-point don't even come with a front camera, so don't take it for granted.

SCREEN

The Lumia 435 uses a 4-inch LED TN panel, which is a far cry from the IPS displays found on most modern smartphones. Viewing angles tend to be very poor with TN panels and it's immediately evident here, with very obvious colour deviations and contrast changes at obtuse angles. I did notice that viewing the phone from a side doesn't seem to produce as much of a negative effect as viewing it from above.

The resolution is also very low at only 800 x 480 pixels. This equates to roughly 233 pixels

per inch, which is far below the threshold for the average human eye. As such, pixilation is slightly evident at normal viewing distances, though it's not hardly as bad as I expected. There's also a decent level of colour reproduction which helps to overshadow some of the panels shortcomings. It just so happens that the minimal design of Windows Phone is also well suited to low resolution screens.

PERFORMANCE

The device uses a 1.2 GHz Snapdragon 200 processor, which is only an entry-level dual core chip. The performance reflects this, with some apps opening slower than usual and loading times taking a noticeable few seconds too long. Browsing the user interface and opening utility apps such as the alarm was still pleasingly speedy, with little lag between initial input and result.

My usual benchmarking game of Asphalt 8: Airborne refused to play on the Lumia 435, bringing up a strange internet connection error. I decided to try the next best title I could think of and downloaded Halo: Spartan Assault instead. It actually ran pretty well overall, with the only frame drops occurring when the action got a little heated. The 1,560 mAh battery may not sound much on paper but thanks to the low-end Snapdragon, I was almost able to get a day of solid use before it brought up the warning message.

SOFTWARE

The Lumia 435 uses the latest version of Windows Phone 8.1, though it doesn't get the Lumia Denim update due to hardware constraints. The OS has really matured over the past year and it shows in some of the features now available. It's almost able to match Android and iOS when it comes to the core functionalities, although it's fair to say that some of those are not quite as robust versus the competition.

The app store still holds it back, with a poor selection of Triple-A third party applications. Snapchat is completely absent and Instagram only exists in a neglected BETA form. Even the official Facebook app from Microsoft struggles to match iOS and Android. If it wasn't for committed third party Windows Phone developers such as Rudy Hyun making viable alternatives to these, the store would be a dire place indeed.

VERDICT

For 40 quid, you'd do well to get anything close to this on competing platforms. While the camera is poor and the screen is pretty mediocre, you're still getting a fully functioning smartphone that runs the Windows Phone OS to a passable standard. While it does show its limitations in some places, I was surprised how fluid the experience was on such a low-end device. I'm still not sure if this says more about the OS than the device itself.

Windows 10 Test Drive

Microsoft's new Windows 10 Mobile could redefine the struggling operating system within the mobile sector when it arrives on its rumoured October release date. With a scalable user interface and more, just how good is it shaping up? Tom Wellburn investigates Build 10149.

icrosoft is betting a lot on Windows 10. The Redmond company has placed its entire future vision on the basis of a fully integrated, scalable Operating System that can be applied to any device regardless of size. With the desktop version of Windows 10 quickly nearing completion, I decided to take the plunge and jump onto the mobile bandwagon. Microsoft has been offering early access to the software for some time through the Windows Insider Program, though previous builds were far too buggy to be considered usable in the long-term. With Windows 10 Mobile slated for a rumoured October release date, I decided to test drive the software for an entire month and see if it was up to scratch. Risky? Incredibly. Let's see how it goes.

Installation and first impressions



Downloading the software was straightforward. You sign up for a free developers account through the Microsoft website before downloading the insider app on your phone.

After this you're asked if you want to join the 'slow ring' or 'fast ring'. Those who choose the former will get updates less often but they will likely be more stable. I jumped in at the deep end and chose fast ring. The phone then proceeded to do the usual stuff, downloading and installing the update with very little issue. After about 45 minutes or so I was ready to try Windows 10. The build that I downloaded was 10149, which was said by many online to be the most stable yet. Some even said it should be possible to use it every day.

MODERN FEEL

When the phone rebooted I was treated to the brand-spanking new Windows 10 OS, which I must admit had me impressed. It has a far more modernised feel than Windows Phone 8.1, which is in part thanks to the full screen background and closer live tile arrangement. Icons are now far sharper and slimmer than previous versions, with a completely new settings menu that is far easier to understand. The notifications section is also much better, with in-line responding to text messages now possible through toasts and the action centre.

Talking of the Action Centre, that has also undergone a substantial improvement, with more quick action icons and better handling of bulk notifications. No more cascading lines of app notifications that will clog up your screen!

The phone continued to download my apps in the background while I browsed the new interface and it also carried across my previous live tile arrangement from Windows Phone 8.1.

SMOOTH OPERATOR

The first thing to catch my eye was the overall speed of the operating system. Windows Phone 8.1 has always been a very smooth OS that runs well on low-end hardware. It is one of the most proud features that it can cry home about. Windows 10 Mobile already feels on a par with its predecessor, so it should be interesting to see just how much faster it can get. While browsing through the interface was quick and speedy, apps did tend to hang. Splash screens stuck around for a little bit longer than I would've liked, which took away from the overall responsiveness of the user interface.

Most of the Microsoft applications were updated to their Windows 10 variants. Currently unavailable to the public, they represent the new design themes that will be a commonplace within the new OS. My first thought was 'Oh god, why the hamburger menus?', but I soon got over it. The first party apps now look fantastic, which is a far cry from Windows 8.1. While the Bing applications were good, the design themes in things such as the email and calendar apps were bland at best. Now they look stunning. There's also a lot more features in them, with landscape support and the ability to flag/archive mail at the flick of a finger.

Microsoft purchased Acompli, a popular email application for iOS and Android, several months ago and it's clear that the design themes have been carried over for Outlook in Windows Mobile 10. In many ways it feels like the exact same application besides some of the

icons and logos. This is not necessarily a bad thing. I did find the overall mailbox system a little awkward, as switching between accounts was slower than in Windows Phone 8.1. Individual inboxes can be pinned to the start screen but currently the live tiles don't work, meaning you can't see your message count. A little disappointing. On a positive note, the mail and calendar apps are now completely integrated, giving a nice interaction between the two. Everything in the calendar works the same as in the previous version of Windows, it's just that now it's a lot more visually striking.

APPS UPDATED

The photo and music apps have also received big updates in line with the new design themes. Anybody who used the music application on Windows Phone 8.1 will remember what a disaster it was, with an unimaginable amount of bugs hampering the experience. Microsoft was so embarrassed that they assigned a special team of developers to release bi-weekly updates in effort to improve the app. Even now, it's still not up to scratch when compared to the previous version in Windows Phone 8.0. Thankfully, this new version is a lot better, with a much improved interface and easier navigation.

oplications

Artists, songs and playlists are now neatly organised in a sidebar that is easily accessed by hitting a hamburger button at the top of the screen. The now playing section is much easier to understand, with a scrub feature that doesn't need baby fingers to use. The artist backgrounds for the now playing also seemed to render much better, with the app recognising much more artists than in previous versions. The only disappointment was the lack of a live tile but I would expect that the

feature will make an appearance in later builds. Microsoft Edge was present in this build, which is the new web browser set to replace Internet Explorer. I'd like to say it felt better but I couldn't really tell the difference. The app suffered from a strange hanging issue where it wouldn't navigate to a requested URL. The only option was to close and reopen the application until it came back to life. On the few times I could get it working, it certainly felt smooth. It had a few issues formatting certain websites (such as our own What Mobile), choosing to zoom out and display the full page.

In terms of speed, there was no complaints. Image heavy websites like IGN instantly sprung to life with no delay or stuttered loading, which is excellent for a mobile browser.

INCREASED FUNCTIONALITY

The Maps application is another highlight, jumping ahead of HERE to offer much more functionality. There's now a street view option, plus an awesome 3D Cities option which allows you to view a select few destinations in full three dimensions. It is worth noting that the 3D city viewer is extremely intensive and my Lumia 830 was really struggling to run it. Also, all of the included cities are mostly in the United States with only one currently available in the UK. No, it's not London... It's err, Southampton? Overall navigation isn't that much different to HERE Maps, as they both share the same maps database.

On top of the major applications, Microsoft has also updated all of the utility apps to coincide with the new design themes. Calculator, podcasts, voice recorder, alarms, Store, OneDrive and the People Hub have all undergone positive changes, looking far better visually than their predecessors. The People Hub is now more like a contacts book than anything else, with Microsoft dropping support for the Rooms feature that made it unique. You still have the ability to aggregate social media news feeds and view them in a ticker style format for each contact, though it's a little buggy in this build and some apps that used to work with it now don't.

PEOPLE SEARCH

Possibly the biggest addition for the People Hub is the addition of a search bar. Finally, we can at least search for contacts by name! The visual redesign of the Store is also better, looking much closer to the desktop version. At the time of testing, it was still in BETA and did feel a little slow at times though it should be finalised by the next build. There's also a fully-fledged file explorer included in the build, which is a welcome addition.

My personal experiences

In using the device for a month, I documented a few issues that cropped up and caused some serious problems with my experience. Notably in the first week I had two catastrophic crashes where a hard reset was the only option. The first crash completely froze my phone, meaning I had to use the recovery tool and do a complete restore. Thankfully, the process was relatively straightforward though I did lose everything stored on the device.

The second major crash came after a slew of background app updates which rendered my device useless. All of the apps would suddenly bring up an error message and refuse to open, meaning the only option was a hard reset. An ongoing issue that has also been reported by Microsoft is a problem with the messaging application, of which I have consistently been affected. Even after several resets, I still can't get my ingoing and outgoing texts to deliver correctly. Apparently, this is due to a bug with the Gmail account integration, of which I use several for my emails.

TRIAL AND ERROR

I also had frequent issues with the Store applications, which was probably due to Microsoft's decision to include both the old Store application and the new Store app. Downloading and updating applications was incredibly sporadic, with some refusing to install from the new Store and some refusing to install from the old. It was a case of trial and error to get some to download, meaning I wasted masses of data on failed background updates and installs. It was at that point that I decided to turn off automatic updates and force them myself. Even this failed to solve the issue.

These were the main issues that I faced, but they were far from the only things that happened. App glitches were a common occurrence, though not as frequent as I expected. Facebook Messenger failed on me several times, needing a few reinstalls to function correctly. Combine this with the app stores issues outlined above and you have a recipe for disaster.

There was also occasions where the phone would hang on the lockscreen, giving a blank screen. Repeated presses of the lock key until it started working again were the only way to get around it. Notifications would come through later than expected at times and my appointment didn't work until about two week in when it suddenly sprung to life. Then there was the formatting bugs, which is likely due to the scaling feature found in Windows 10. As an OS that is designed to dynamically scale to any device format and screen size, I can sympathise that such a feature is a mammoth undertaking with lots of work needed. Still, to see the settings screen bloat to four times its size at random intervals was still quite a funny sight to behold.

Can we use it as a daily driver? Almost!

Now we come to the ultimate question, is it ready for daily use? While I'd love to say yes, it's still got a little way to go before I would consider throwing it on my Lumia 830 full-time. It's come leaps and bounds from previous builds, which were buggy as hell and full of unfinished applications. There's also a much more clear design theme, as evident by the direction which most of the first party apps are now taking. In previous versions, it felt somewhat like patchwork quilt, with user interface inconsistencies everywhere that amounted to a confusing experience. Now we are at a stage where we can really see the fruits of Microsoft's labour starting to pay off. In terms of the UI, I would argue that it is probably fairly close to the final version and doesn't need much work. The only major problem lies in the bugs and it's something that will continue to improve as the months pass. If it wasn't for the occasional crashes and irritating glitches, I would've adopted this as my daily driver immediately. The overall speed of the thing is excellent and in a few builds time I can definitely see this reaching a polished stage where my opinion will change entirely.

t's all happened to us before. You're playing Candy Crush on your commute home, trying to WhatsApp your friends or using Google Maps to head to a new location and the screen goes black. The battery's just died and your phone has been rendered useless. Short battery life seems to be a common issue with modern smartphones and many companies have been trying to come up with ways to remedy this problem. A simple solution is the power bank. Power banks are devices which transfer juice into your smartphone to give it more energy. These can be life savers if you find your phone running worryingly low on battery life halfway throughout the day.

But there's more to consider than just popping into a phone shop and picking up any old power bank. You'll have to consider how much mAh it stores. The more mAh a power bank's battery can store, the more

energy it can transfer into your smartphone. So a power bank that can store 2,600mAh in its battery can transfer more juice to a phone than a power bank that stores 2,000mAh. There's also the design. Some power banks are larger than others. The heavyweight power banks normally have room to charge more than one device at the same time, so it's worth considering whether the power bank matches your own lifestyle. What power bank should you go for? We tested a number of power banks to see if size does matter and whether a smaller power bank is just as good as a larger one.

Xoopar Squid Mini 5.200mAh Dual USB Power Bank **Price:** £24.99 **mAh:** 5,200

We've got no complaints about the amount of power this power bank stores – it has enough power to quickly charge two devices at once or an iPhone twice over – but the design has let it down. It is not as compact as most other power banks in our test and the suction cups, used to attach the power bank to the back of your phone and create a makeshift stand, seemed a little bit gimmicky.



The EE Power Bank gets points for having one unique feature none of the other power banks have: once it runs out of juice, you can head into an EE shop and swap it for a fully-charged one free of charge. This means you needn't have to wait ages charging up the power bank up when it's empty, and it packs a decent amount of juice too.

Upon first glance this power bank looks just look a black slab. But look more closely and you'll discover it is a versatile device that can quickly charge both Android and Apple devices. Compartments to store various cables makes this one of the more discreet and attractive power banks on our list, whilst an LED indicator tells you how much energy is left in the power bank.



PNY Powerpack T2600 Price: £10.99 mAh: 2,600

A power pack that's both very welldesigned and does a fantastic job of charging up your phone. We got an impressive 1 per cent of charge every minute, but it's let down by the fact that it



doesn't store enough energy to fully charge your device. It's compact cylindrical design means you can easily stick it in your bag, purse or pocket without it taking up too much space.







Olixar Charge & Sync Micro USB Power Bank **Price:** £9.99 **mAh:** 1,500

The compact design of this power bank makes it one of the most portable in our list. You can easily wrap and store the device's USB cable discreetly inside the device, eliminating any unsightly cables or the likelihood of losing any microUSB leads. It doesn't store as much juice as the other power banks, unfortunately, which means you're unlikely to get a full charge from this power bank.





Linearflux LithiumCard Portable Power Bank **Price:** £29.99 **mAh:** 1,200

This little power bank really impressed us with its size. The thin credit card-sized shape meant we could easily stick it into our wallet, whilst the metallic design made it feel much more rugged than the plastic-bodied power banks we tested. A kevlar-reinforced charging cable means you'll have no worries of any frayed wires. You'll also get a decent number of additional hours from using this device, too; five hours to be precise.

Snooper Ventura PB60 10400mAh Power Bank Price: £39.99 mAh: 10,400

The Snooper Ventura is certainly one of the most uniquely designed power banks we've tested. It's composed of five cylindrical batteries housed in an orange shell. This flexible shell lets you mould the power bank into any shape, whilst its bright orange design makes it easy to find. It also packs a whopping 10,400mAh of power, which lets you quickly charge an iPhone 6 four times over.

Cobra JumPack Price: £79.99 mAh: 7,500

Don't let the Cobra JumPack's compact size fool you. It has enough power to jumpstart a car. We didn't test it on a car, but we can say that its 7,500 mAh does a decent job of rapidly recharging your handset. It's also equipped with an LED light, which makes it perfect if you're stranded on the roadside and need to get someone's attention.





We put the video capabilities of the Samsung Galaxy S6 Edge, LG G4 and Nokia Lumia 930 to the test.

Wave and the comparison of the comparison test using the four best smartphones currently available. There were two clear winners in the test, the Samsung Galaxy S6 Edge and the LG G4. Both had excellent image quality that was simply too good for the competition. This issue, we decided to throw the gauntlet down on them again and subject them to a video comparison test against a professional camcorder. We realise that two smartphones isn't much of a test, so we've also thrown in the Microsoft Lumia 930 for good measure, another device that has a fantastic camera.

COMMON GROUND

Why have we picked these three devices in particular? Simple, they all shoot in the highest video standard possible. 4K video is the current buzzword surrounding smartphone video and it's a pretty big deal indeed. 4K equates to the number of horizontal pixels in the image; that means that each video shot on these devices has a monstrous 4096 pixels along its widest side. The 4K cinema standard that each of these smartphones use is 4096 x 2160, this equates to a mind-boggling 8,847,360 pixels! We wanted to see if all of these extra megapixels and flagship post-processing features could make them a match for a professional camcorder, so that's exactly what we've done.

THE TEST

The camcorder we'll be putting them up against is a trusty Sony Z1, a solid workhorse camera that has been used for many years. Although it's a little old by today's standards, it is still heavily used within the TV production scene due to its reliable image quality and solid durability.

The Sony Z1 shoots at a resolution of 1440 x 1080i, then uses some fancy upscaling to increase the image to Full HD 1920 x 1080i. This means that on paper it actually shoots at a much lower resolution than its counterparts. The thing is, the Z1e has a trump card up its sleeve. It actually uses three 1/3" sensors for each piece of the RGB colour spectrum. The effective sensor size of all three combined is much higher than that of the comparative smartphones. It also has a full suite of manual controls, allowing maximum control of the shooting process.

For the test we'll be shooting in three differing scenes, each showcasing a different element of the camera's functionality. We will also be conducting three smaller tests which focus on the inner workings of the hardware.

Unless manual settings are available, we will revert to whatever automatic settings the smartphones use by default. We'll start by addressing this fact and admitting that none of them have manual video settings. If you try to set them up beforehand, it simply reverts to automatic when recording.

All video footage is completely unedited and straight from the device, so you can be sure that the test will be 100% accurate. The only exception is the Z1, where we have supplied both a graded and ungraded images for comparison. Since the Z1 is a professional camcorder that is manufactured to produce natural, somewhat uninspiring images that are perfect for post-production, it offers the fairest comparison to the incredibly vibrant and oversaturated smartphone equivalents.

test 1: MACRO

For this test we headed to Clissold Park in London's Stoke Newington, which is home to several animals, birds and insects. We intended to take the footage in the Butterfly Dome, which was unfortunately shut. Luckily, we stumbled across this plant teeming with bees as we were leaving somewhat disappointed. It turned out to be a great spot for testing the macro capabilities of the cameras. Macro is defined as large-scale, literally meaning 'bigger than usual'. It's essentially close-up video designed to pick out all the detail in tiny insects and the like.

All of the three cameras performed very well in this test, with mostly excellent autofocus picking out the nuances of detail. If we had to pick a winner it would probably be the Lumia 930, though we must stress it was very close. The Samsung Galaxy S6 Edge and LG G4 both produces very sharp videos with excellent levels of detail but we couldn't help feeling they were both a little over-vibrant. Colours popped too much and the LG G4 seemed a touch too sharp. The Lumia 930 seemed more natural

overall, with a pleasingly neutral colour palette. We were also able to get a little closer with the Lumia 930 without losing focus, something which is evident in the video tests. Despite the Lumia 930 also having the highest aperture of all the cameras on test, it also managed to produce the best depth of field. This is a probably a result of being able to get closer to the subject.

Still, none of them could match the benchmark Z1e. The camera was able to zoom much further, with the variable aperture allowing for greater control over depth of field. The manual focus also allowed selective focus of the area we wanted, instead of relying on the software to 'get it right'. The resulting footage was expectedly dull but beautifully natural. When graded, you can see just how much a professional camera can excel in producing that 'TV look' we all aspire to achieve.

While the 4K made the image sharper on compatible screens, it didn't help to make the overall image better. All those pixels couldn't overshadow the much better result given by the Sony Z1e





TEST 2: MOTION

The next test was a simple one to see if motion was going to cause any issues with the recordings. For this, all we needed was a busy street and plenty of traffic. After leaving the park, we found a junction not far away which was perfect for the test. Cars and cyclists littered the road, with only a red traffic light separating us.

One of the core aspects in video is how the camera handles fastmoving scenes. Motion blur is a common side-effect of this and sadly it is unavoidable in most cases. Unless you own a high-speed camera capable of shooting at ridiculously high frame rates, things will never be pin-sharp. Still, we've become accustomed to this technological limitation and it is now a desirable effect in cinema to achieve that authentic 'film look'. This dates back to original film cameras which used to shoot in 24 frames per second. When people think of the film look, this is basically what they are describing. Higher frame rates tend to look strange in cinema and are often described as too smooth.

All three of the smartphones produced similar results, recording in 30 frames per second. There was very little motion blur and the overall scene was pretty damn sharp, with zero ghosting tails behind each of the objects. Compared with the benchmark, which only records at 25FPS, they retained more motion detail due to the higher frame rate. It is also worth noting that the Z1e records in an interlaced format, compared with the smartphones which all record in a progressive format. The former is known for being poorer when shooting fast-moving objects and is much more suited to interviews and presenting work. In this test, it most definitely shows.

4K: YAY OR NAY

Unsurprisingly, 4K can't really help with motion as it plays no part in it. Having a sharper image won't suddenly increase the frame-rate. In fact, in the case of the smartphones, it actually decreased it. All three of the smartphones were only able to shoot at a maximum of 30 frames per second in 4K versus 60 in 1080p.



TEST 3: NIGHT

For this we wanted to test out the shooting capabilities of the cameras in a generic night-time setting. Rather than finding somewhere that was pitch black, we wanted a naturally lit area that had a good contrast between dark and light elements. It just so happens that an area of Whitechapel high street was the perfect spot. Night shots are always going to be difficult for smartphone cameras, whether it's a flagship shooter or not. Unsurprisingly, none of the three excelled in the test. There was a definite loser, though the other two were fairly close.

The Lumia 930 performed pretty badly in this test. The image was devoid of noise, which is a definite plus... But it was also devoid of any sort of detail. It was just black. It seems that Microsoft had decided to dial back the gain in favour of keeping the image relatively clean; this unfortunately meant that it was near impossible to pick anything out. We even attempted to boost the shadows using software in an attempt to see if any detail had been retained for post-production uses. Alas, the camera

had recorded none of it. To add further insult to injury, our old Lumia 920 even performed better in low light than the Lumia 930. Ouch. As for the other two, we'd say that the LG G4 narrowly pips it, though it definitely amounts to a matter of taste. The Samsung retained a bit more noise, which can be seen in the sky, whereas the LG G4 opted for some more aggressive noise reduction. The LG G4 also had a slightly warmer colour palette, which we prefer to the Samsung's strange, greeny/yellow tinge.

The benchmark Sony Z1e was business as usual. It captured far more of the dynamic range, with an evenly lit scene that showed all the visible detail. The colour range was also way more neutral than the competition, which we would guess is one reason why the camera captured so much detail. The smartphones all attempted to compensate by dialling up the saturation and contrast to crazy amounts, resulting in a lot of lost detail in the shadows. High contrast does not always mean better.

You would expect 4K to make it easier for details in the image to pop out but this was not the case. The smartphones all struggled to capture sufficient detail overall, which meant that all those extra pixels basically became redundant.





ADDITIONAL TESTS

We also conducted three smaller tests in order to gauge every area of the cameras recording capabilities.

Sound:

The Lumia 930 was a welldeserved winner here, with its Dolby digital surround sound and rich recording capabilities overshadowing the LG and Samsung devices. The LG sounded a little thin and the Samsung was dull. Neither of them could record a concert without the expected distortion, whereas the Lumia managed it without any fuss.

Zoom:

None of the smartphone cameras had an optical zoom, so the only available option for distant videos was digital zoom, which degrades the picture quality. While there was no clear winner, the Lumia 930's higher megapixel count means it can theoretically zoom in further without as much degradation.

Image Stabilisation:

The LG G4 and Nokia Lumia 930 both retain optical image stabilisation while recording in 4K, while the Samsung disables it for anything higher than 1080p. This sadly means that when shooting in those ultra-high resolutions, you'll need to be more careful with the latter. While it's close between the Lumia 930 and the LG G4, we'd have to say that the technology in the Lumia is ever slightly more superior at keeping your shots stable.



CONCLUSION

Let's cut to the chase; they don't compete with a true camcorder. Image quality may be better when taken straight from the device, but grading shows just what the Sony Z1e is capable of. The smartphones favour an immediately desirable image over the ability to tweak it afterwards; this is somewhat expected. There's also a complete lack of manual shooting options, which makes it incredibly difficult to properly expose and colour balance your shot.

Was there a clear winner overall? It's hard to say and, while we are inclined to say the Lumia 930, its low-light shooting really let it down. It happily won in all other areas on the test but you sadly can't rely on it for general purpose shooting. For night recording, both the LG G4 and Samsung will likely suffice. If you want a daytime device, get the Lumia 930.

We'd also conclude that 4K is still nothing more than a gimmick. While it seems cool on paper and produces some very detailed video, it doesn't really enhance the image as much as expected. Plus, in the case of the Samsung Galaxy S6 Edge, it even causes certain features to be lost as a result. If recording in 4K means that you can't use optical image stabilisation, it's probably better to lower the resolution.

Mercenaries Saga 2 $\star \star \star \star \star$

If you're a fan of Final Fantasy Tactics, then this is probably the closest you'll get to a true successor. It might not be developed by Square Enix but you can immediately feel the heritage when booting up the game. Everything from the graphics to the gameplay offers an immediate comparison to the popular JRPG, which could be seen by some as a rip-off. To say that this feels like a Square Enix game should be the ultimate compliment.

The primary mercenaries' mode is fairly big, offering 32 missions and roughly 20 hours of gameplay for most people. The storyline is typical zany fantasy and centres around the poisoning of a prince, who the main character must save by embarking on a quest to find the antidote. There's no obligation to follow the story and text can be freely skipped at any point, though I urge you to follow it through or you'll be missing out. Without an overworld or any type of map, the story arc is the only thing that stops the game from being a series of random battles with no connection.

Each battle takes place in an arena made up of grid-like squares. In a similar vain to Final Fantasy Tactics, players must carefully negotiate

their characters around the battlefield in a turn-based fashion to kill the enemy. You'll be using various types of weapons and spells to dispose of them, each with a particular set of traits. Terrain and positioning both play key factors within each battle, with the winner gaining money, experience and skill points for a successful victory. Each battle takes around 30 minutes to complete, with the very little animations to slow down the action. While I'd never call a turn-based RPG fast and frantic, it definitely feels fluent.

TACTICAL FREEDOM

Points can then be spent in between battles, with an emphasis on upgrading stats and buying new weapons and armour. Each character will initially be locked into a specific class, which limits them to a particular set of skills. Once you reach level 20, the shackles are off and you can freely swap classes between battles. It's a neat little progressive element that stops earlier levels being too easy but still gives you the tactical freedom in later, harder levels.

While the graphics don't dazzle, they have a nostalgic feel that is very similar to classic 2D RPGs. The only disappointing factor is the lack of touch-screen support. As the primary feature on the 3DS, you would've expected them to make more use of it than just a second screen for tracking stats. Still, at only £3.99 in the Nintendo eShop I think it's unfair to get picky with such a great title.

If you're after a Final Fantasy Tactics fix and can't wait for Square Enix to produce another, this is definitely a worthwhile substitute.



Comic Workshop 2 $\star \star \star \star \star$

I remember playing Mario Paint for the SNES as a kid and being thoroughly engrossed in the primitive concepts of filling pre-determined photographs with blocks of colour. The game still stands as one of my most remembered titles as a child and I still have the mouse peripheral somewhere in my attic to prove it. Comic Workshop 2 essentially feels like a much more modern version of this, giving you a more professional platform with which to partake in your favourite creative pastime.

The game goes surprisingly deep and allows you to draw on a blank canvas or use pre-set storyboard windows with a distinct manga inspiration. If you want to create a comic with a distinct manga theme, this is one of the few painting titles out there that will allow you to do it so quickly. You get an assortment of pencils and pens which can be set to varying thicknesses and opacities, along with stamps and rollers for painting backgrounds and quickly filling areas. The touchscreen is used for drawing and hardly feels the most responsive; most of the time it was easier to import pre-defined images and use the game as a presentation tool.

The game does offer Miiverse support, which is a welcome addition over its predecessor, though the execution is somewhat limited. You can only share original drawing created by yourself, which limits the games capability as a true comic workshop. Still, this is unavoidable and sits inline with Nintendo's strict sharing policy. They're only trying to protect the younglings from the obligatory phallic comics that would appear should photo imports be allowed. This I completely understand.







Samurai Warriors $\star \star \star \star \star$ Chronicles 3

If you're a fan of mass beat em' ups such as Dynasty Warriors, this game will be right up your alley. Samurai Warriors Chronicles 3 is a spin-off of said title, offering a more personal approach compared with the character-driven elements of the Dynasty Warriors franchise. In this game, the focus lies in creating your own character and guiding them through a plot which is loosely based on the samurai in 16th century Japan. It's a great idea for newcomers who may not have kept up with previous instalments and fits well within the pick-up-and-play handheld ecosystem.

Gameplay remains unchanged to past iterations, with huge armies and plenty of hack 'n' slashing being the order of the day. You can use all the standard attack and combos to dispose of foes, as well as the supers which annihilate large portions of the battlefield in a single move. You now have the option of controlling four characters on the battlefield, which opens things up for a little variety. In practice, it's not really that much different from using the two characters in previous incarnations. It'll help you stay closer to the action but not much else.

A bonding system indicates how much your fellow samurai admire you, though it takes a great deal of effort to really pull off. It's also a bit pointless too, as it's only really useful for unlocking extra slices of the story. In battle, it offers no benefits whatsoever. There's also a fair amount of slowdown when the action gets hectic, which is exasperated by using the 3D. A shame for an otherwise fun game.

PlayStation Vita

Geometry Wars 3: Dimensions Evolved

Geometry Wars is a classic twin-stick shooter that is made for one purpose: brutally punishing anyone who tries to conquer it. If you've played other games in the genre before, you'll likely know what to expect here. Enemies come in all sorts of polygonal forms and it's your job to shoot them before they shoot you. Bizarre Creations first developed Geometry Wars as a mini-game for the highly popular Project Gotham Racing series. Players could access it through the in-game garage and enjoy a little bit of retro inspired fun in-between races.

The third incarnation carries everything over from the second title plus more. The basic five high-score modes from Geometry Wars: Touch/Retro Evolved 2 are all included in Classic Mode: Deadline, Retro, King, Pacifism and Waves. There's also an insanely difficult adventure mode, where high scores unlock boss battles which help to progress to the next level. It's pitched as a campaign, though it feels more like a series of challenges that you need to overcome. Still, with more than 50 levels to complete, you'll be clocking up high scores for quite a while before you get bored. That's probably Geometry Wars' most defining feature, the leaderboards. Never has a game left so compulsive in the need to have 'just one more go'. Seeing a friend beat your hi-score is devastating and fun at the same time.

Possibly the coolest new feature in Geometry Wars 3 is ability to fight

in fully three-dimensional arenas that that twist and turn as you navigate them. While none of the levels are particularly insane with regards to their design, it's probably for the best. Trying to avoid hordes of neon gunfire on a frantically spinning planet-like object is disorientating enough, thanks. Thankfully, this is somewhat alleviated by a series of friendly drones which will accompany you during the level, mirroring your movements and attacking foes. It takes some of the pressure off yourself but also makes the game even more frantic. Like it couldn't already get any crazier.

FULL GAME EXPERIENCE

Enemy counts and bullet counts remain the same as the console version, though certain visual effects have been dialled back to keep the game moving at a smooth 60 frames-per-second. It's mostly just background-related stuff like scenery and ambient effects, which means you'll still get to experience all the flashy neon sprites dashing around the screen and exploding when you hit them. On a small screen such as the PlayStation Vita, I would argue that it isn't too much of a loss considering the amount of available screen real-estate. At times it can be difficult enough to see as it is.

Although it's essentially the same game as previous versions, with the additional extra of some 3D maps, Geometry Wars 3: Dimensions still manages to feel fresh and exciting. You'll never play the same level twice, with the random nature of the game creating some truly maddening scenarios. If you have never had the chance to play these titles before, you can't beat this definitive version. Just be prepared to die. A lot.



BlazBlue: Chrono Phantasma EXTEND

As far as crazy Japanese fighting games go, BlazBlue is definitely up there among the craziest. The visual art direction in the game is fantastic, with some striking anime visuals backed up with some dazzling effects. The game follows on from the last-gen version of the same name which released on the Playstation 3. Now gamers can finally get a true portable experience on their Playstation Vita. And what an experience it is.

The formula remains much the same, which is a good thing because there wasn't much wrong to begin with. Attack the other character to fill up your heat gauge and then unleash a devastating special attack that cripples the enemy. A revamped guard gauge system now allows you to dish out Guard Crush attacks when the other player's barrier gauge is low, adding yet another strategic element to the game. It forces players to adopt a more offensive play-style so as to quickly break the opponents guard barrier and get the upper hand.

An additional two characters have been added to the game's 26-strong roster, though only one of them is truly unique enough to stand out: Celica A. Mercury is a refreshing character thanks to her tag team approach that sees a robotic doll mimic her every move but Lambda No.11 is essentially a re-skinned version of Nu -No.13.





NekoBuro – Cats Block

Another match-three puzzler to add to the list, NekoBuro – CatsBlock manages to separate itself with overwhelming cuteness and a bizarre storyline. When a bunch of alien cats are hit by an energy storm, one of them (named Totan) ends up crash landing on Earth. Scared of his new environment, the feline is adopted by a kind-hearted girl named Rino who takes him into her home. Totan quickly realises that he likes Earth and decides the he wants his friends to come join. From there, it's all about completing levels to help Totan reunite with his friends.

With five chapters each consisting of 10 missions each, there's plenty of gameplay in NekoBuro. The basic idea is to line up three coloured cats in a row, getting points for each successful match. Cats come in blocks of three and are shot into the grid Tetris-style, landing on top of what's already there. Early levels are very simple with only a few colours on the board, though later ones can get much more confusing as the different cats begin to stack up. An item bar sits at the bottom right of the screeen and incrementally fills up for each match. Each fill stage will unlock a different item and matching it with the correct coloured cat will unleash a special attack for maximum points.

The art style could be a little too cute for some and the poor translation of text to English is pretty laughable at times. Still, if you can stomach its cringeworthy inconsistencies, you'll be rewarded with a solid puzzler.
